

Church Family,

I have been thinking and praying for a few weeks on "where to go" in the pulpit after we finish our current series, CLOTHED, on May 10. I have landed on a new series called "Inter/Mission: Don't Waste the Wait" (I wrote briefly on this concept a few weeks back). In this series, we will explore several passages that involve waiting on God—for restoration, deliverance, healing, purpose, you name it. Waiting has been an integral part of the life of faith long before the coronavirus pandemic. That same will be true after this season has passed.

Left to our/my own devices, we/I hate waiting, and everything about our culture in recent years has further conditioned our natural inclination against waiting. Long gone are the days of the wood burning oven/stove. We have microwaves or—better yet—fast food chains if preparing food at home seems too time-consuming. We have video streaming services that allow us to binge-watch our favorite shows so that we are not caught in suspense, waiting an entire week (God forbid) between episodes. Two-day shipping on *anything* from *anywhere* has become a standard expectation. For the love of God, don't make us wait.

I recently had a conversation in which someone said: "I know we don't have it 'that bad' waiting at home, but I'm going crazy" (I expressed my empathy, because I am also restless). "I mean, we've come a long way since the Spanish flu a century ago in 1918—we have all sorts of luxuries and conveniences to pass the time that they did not have. Why does this seem so hard?" I responded that precisely because they lacked our modern luxuries and conveniences, they were better accustomed to waiting. Our expectations shape our experiences and we expect not to wait.

Even so, some of our most encouraging Scriptures involve waiting. A quick Google search will confirm that claim. Interestingly, for the biblical writers, waiting is not a passive condition of killing time, but an active praying and seeking and serving God however we can wherever we are until He brings us to the place or condition in which we are not yet. Think about it: one can "wait" for one's food at a restaurant passively with irritation, or one can "wait" tables at a restaurant. I waited tables for a few months after getting engaged to save some extra money—trust me, "waiting" tables is an active and intentional gig.

I would be lying if I told you I knew exactly how God will use this time for our good and His glory, but I firmly believe He is committed to both of those agendas. So, against the natural inclinations of my flesh, I am trying to be patient. When we are tempted to feel like we cannot wait for this season to be over, I encourage you, me—US—to pray for ways to seek and serve God in preparation for whatever lies beyond this sojourn. I, for one, believe that it will be worth the wait.
