OUR Heavenly FATHER Knows what we need Before we ask him!

Matthew 6:8



Church Family,

Last Sunday, we began a new sermon series on what is usually called the "Lord's Prayer." Having examined Jesus' instructions on how NOT to pray (Matthew 6:5-8), next Sunday we begin exploring His teaching on how we should (Matthew 6:9-13). As we mentioned Sunday, Jesus is less concerned with the precise words we use and focuses rather on the posture of hearts before God. I believe this is why Jesus begins by teaching us to pray relationally, addressing God as "Our Father." Pause for a moment. Can our hearts even imagine what a blessing we have to call on the Almighty God of Heaven as "Our Father"?

In college, I participated in an inner-city ministry in Jackson on Monday nights that had a format similar to VBS. One Monday night, I was asked to teach the evening's Bible lesson on the Lord's Prayer. I began by asking our group of fifteen school-age boys what it meant to call God "Father." To my complete surprise, there was no feedback whatsoever. I asked them what came to mind when they thought of their own fathers. My shock intensified and my heart sank. Of the fifteen boys in my group, only four had a father figure. At the time. I had no idea about the national decline in fatherhood and the rise of various social maladies in the wake of that reality. All I knew was that I DID have a father—one who was accessible to me. That night, I could not sleep. Everything in me wanted to talk to my father. I got out of bed in the middle of the night and called my parents (they probably thought I was calling from prison given the late hour...). Overcome with gratitude at a blessing I had long taken for granted, I apologized for all of the times I had challenged them and thanked them for raising me to love and serve God. The sentiment is captured perfectly by a quote from Mark Twain: "When I was a boy of 14, my father

was so ignorant I could hardly stand to have the old man around. But when I got to be 21, I was astonished at how much the old man had learned in seven years." This may (not) surprise you, but I was the most contentious of the three children my parents raised. As a result, my father seemed like a stern disciplinarian during my adolescent years (he reminds me that there was a cause -effect relationship for discipline in our household...).

You can probably guess the rest of the story: my new perspective gradually transformed my relationship—and my communication—with my father. As I have matured over time, I have come to know my father far more intimately as a mentor, professor, colleague, and friend. None of these relational facets undermines his primary role as my father; to the contrary, they enrich it. I'm certain this is a central facet of what Jesus wanted His followers to understand about prayer. Prayer is not a one-sided entreaty to a cold and detached cosmic deity. Prayer is communication within a relationship—a relationship with a God who loved us enough to send His Son to die for sinners. In teaching us to pray to God as our Father, Jesus invites us to see the blessing that has been there all along.
