Masks and social distancing will allow us to gather, but, regretfully, no lunch this year.

Church Family,

There's an old saying: you can't get traction without friction. I was reminded of this truth last week during the Snowpocalypse of 2021. So many people experienced extended losses of power and even water in their homes. Personally, the greatest difficulty with which I was presented was driving in Tupelo during our weekend excursion. Whole parking lots were coated with inches of ice, leaving the pavement undetectable. Even more alarming was the lack of friction and traction beneath our wheels. I was steering a large vehicle, but I did not feel like I was in complete control of it.

During her words of welcome in Sunday worship, Dana Foreman highlighted how much the last year has reminded us that we are not in control. For the last year, many of us have felt the way I felt driving over the weekend. We feel like we are spinning our wheels a bit, unable to make forward progress at the rate we desire if at all. Maybe you feel that way spiritually. Much like your physician, the advice you get from your pastor is relatively consistent. While I don't believe in one-size-fits-all diagnoses or recommendations for the diversity of backgrounds, experiences, and giftings in the body of Christ, there certainly are some common things we can remember in times like this:

- Stay in the WORD. James calls it the "implanted" word (James 1:21). Even (or especially) when we lack traction in our changing circumstances, we can be rooted in the unchanging truth of God's Word. Seek God through the prayerful study of His Word.
- Stay on WITNESS. We are not the first to run the race, and we are not the first to be presented with obstacles along the way. We are reminded in Scripture to lay aside every weight and the sin that so easily ensnares us, "fixing our eyes on Jesus" (Hebrews 12:1-2). We cannot always

control the duration of the journey (our pace) - especially in seasons when we feel like we are spinning our wheels—but we can always affect our direction by fixing our eyes on the destination. Keep your eyes on Christ, and use your life to turn the eyes of the world to Him.

• Stay in WORSHIP. A pastor friend recently said, "If you aren't dead then God isn't done." The Bible tells us, "This is the day that the LORD has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it/Him" (Psalm 118:24). I have found that it is impossible for me to worship God and worry about my lack of control simultaneously. When we feel out of control, the devil tempts us to withdraw from worship when it is precisely what we need. Worship daily. Talk with friends, family, and other believers about God. Asking questions is okay! But be sure to worship God in this season. It will change. He will not.

If you are spinning your wheels and have lost sight of the path beneath, remember that Jesus is the way and that God promises to finish what He started in you (Philippians 1:6).
