
Whoever serves me must follow me; and where I am, my servant also will be. My Father will honor the one who serves me. John 12:26

# Church Family,

This Sunday, we have the special and sacred opportunity to ordain four men from our church family (alphabetically: Elliot Brewer, Timothy Maloney, Sam McCorkle, and Walter Rogers Jr.) to minister as deacons—servants to our congregation. Why do we do this? And what does it mean to be a deacon? Answering the first question is straightforward: both descriptively and prescriptively, inspired biblical writers set forth deacons as an essential component of ministry leadership in the ministry of Christ's church (see Acts 6:1-7, 1 Timothy 3:8-13). The second question, however, has generated much more discussion throughout the ages: what does it mean to be a deacon?

My first Sunday at a previous church, I flipped to the back of the bulletin and noticed a spot just above the space where staff ministry positions were listed. It said, simply, "Every member a minister." In other words, all of God's people are called to minister and serve. The texts calling Christians to serve in and through the Church—the bride of Christ (!)—are too numerous to list. Even so, from the earliest days of the church (see the Acts passage listed above), some Christians have been set aside to take the lead in serving.

All soldiers in an army are dedicated to the task. They all risk, all serve, all sacrifice. But some in the army serve as officers, bearing a unique responsibility to those in their charge. This is what deacons (often called officers in churches) are to the church. As a wiser, more experienced pastor once said to me, "If the ordained clergy are called to be servant leaders, then deacons are called to be leading servants." As a church we are called to be on watch to identify those of solid Christian character who set a pattern for leading in service



that we might ordain them, encourage them, and equip them to take the lead in that capacity.

Jesus tells His disciples in Mark 10:43 that anyone wanting to be great in His kingdom must make themselves the least and a servant to all; interestingly, he uses the word "deacon" here. In verse 45, He continues, "For even the Son of Man did not come to be served (literally, deaconed) but to serve (literally, to deacon) and to give His life as a ransom for many." The greatest of deacons is the greatest of servants, taking the lead and leading others to follow the servant example of Christ.


